## EARLY HISTORY OF SAN DIEGUITO

## SI-MO-JAPANESE WAR

Greenhain, a town just east of Encinitas, was first settled in 1890 by a group of Germans. A school was started a few months later and was attended by five students. Quite a far cry from our new school plant.

Green Valley, a neighboring town, was settled in about 1893 by the Sellers, Lienhardts, and Liverpools. They also started a school which was attended by three pupils.

In the two districts, as in Encinitas, water was procured from a well in Cottonwood Canyon, that property being owned by the railroad. The two towns are still rather old-fashioned and have only recently procured electricity.
