THE STORY OF BANKING

Shortly after the opening of the new school, the San Dieguito Union High School Bank will open its doors to the depositors of the student body. Any member of the Junior or Senior High School may become a depositor in his own right! Think of it: Each student may deposit or withdraw money from his account just the same as it is done in a regular full-fledged institution.

Plans are now being formulated, so that this service may be available to you as soon as possible. You may deposit your savings at your bank or at your school. A "thrift habit" is one that you should develop now! And your deposit draws interest too.

In order that we may know something about banks, we first have to know something about with what banks deal. We all hear about money. We do know that money is a necessity. Imagine trying to get along without it. If we do not have money, and there happens to be someone around from whom we can borrow the amount, we do it, at least if the person wants to. He is extending credit to us. Don't become excited about this credit word. It is nothing but a simple act of loaning on the promise that it will be paid back at some time in the future.

If we buy a suit of clothes on credit, the merchant charges us for it; he puts the amount we owe him on his books. This is known as an open account credit, and is evidence to the merchant that we owe him. When he puts the amount into his books, it is known as an entry. This is the kind of arrangement stores make today with persons buying on credit. That wasn't very difficult was it?
