MODERN NAPOLEON?

Is Hitler seeking to become another conqueror of Europe? All indications seem to point toward the face that he is. Last Saturday he very successfully completed the first step in his series of Napoleonic wars, by the seizure of Austria. His program next calls for the seizure of Czechoslovakia, and then Poland, or visa versa. Hitler's reason for wanting Poland is twofold. First, it would connect Germany with East Prussia which is a part of Germany, but is separated by that part of Poland which extends to the sea. Second, the seizure of Poland would place Germany on the Soviet Frontier where she could strike at Russia in event of a three power alliance of Germany, Italy, and Japan, against Russia. Germany also wants to be in position

to seize the Russian Ukraine, in case of another war.

France clearly warned Hitler that she would immediately come to the aid of Czechoslovakia in the event that he attacked that country.

Whether or not Hitler seeks to become another sort of Red Napoleon remains to be seen and probably will be seen in the very near future. One thing is certain, and that is---Germany, Japan, and Italy are flirting with another world war, which may explode at any time.
