PEOPLE WILL TALK

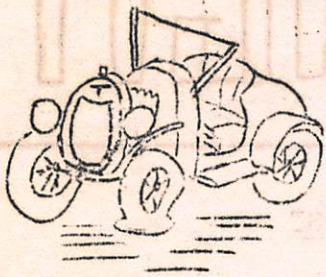
We may get through the world, but

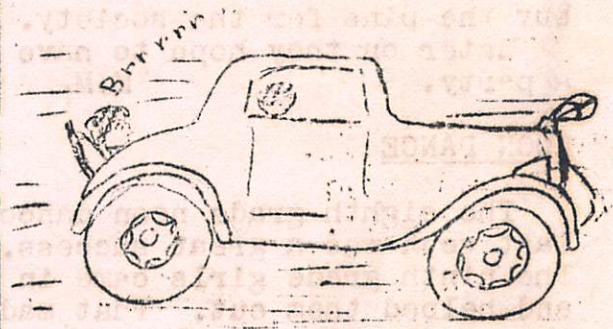
